JHGS Pupil Premium Report 2017-2018

Introduction and Aims

John Hampden Grammar School has a responsibility to spend the Pupil Premium on interventions as it sees fit within our context to support the attainment of our Pupil Premium students. The school spends its allocated Pupil Premium funding each year with the following four aims:

1. To close the academic attainment gap between Pupil Premium students and non-Pupil Premium students.
2. To ensure that Pupil Premium students can fully access the curriculum, including costs associated with the curriculum such as voluntary contributions for educational visits and revision materials.
3. To ensure that Pupil Premium students can be engaged in the wider life of the school, such as in sports clubs, the Duke of Edinburgh's Award and music lessons.
4. To ensure that all Pupil Premium students continue onto post 16 programmes of study after completing KS4.

The school is rightly proud of the attainment of Pupil Premium students in 2016 and 2017 where they have had a positive Progress 8 score, and particularly in 2017 where JHGS was the only secondary school in High Wycombe with a positive Progress 8 score. That said, JHGS is acutely aware of the attainment gap between the Pupil Premium students and their peers, and we are determined to close the gap. There is an average of 8 Pupil Premium students per year group, so data about the group's attainment can be affected significantly by outliers, as has been the case in 2018.

This report details the academic attainment of Pupil Premium students in 2017/2018, the spending in that academic year, and the spending plans for the 2018/2019 academic year.

Pupil Premium Grant - Spending Plans in 2018/2019

The school intends to refocus some spending away from extra-curricular involvement and access towards academic support and intervention for Pupil Premium students. New initiatives for this year will include:

- 1) Weekly academic / study skills support sessions with the Learning Support Department for small groups of students.
- 2) Dedicated one-to-one sessions with Foreign Language Assistants to ensure that students can access extra support in MFL subjects.
- 3) An expansion of the hours of the school's mentoring and counselling service (which the Pupil Premium students make greater use of than the student body at large).

Departments will also be encouraged to apply to use funding that will be used to support academic outcomes. For example, the Pupil Premium Grant will be used to help pay for new literacy interventions in English and for Maths revision software.

In order to achieve this, the school will no longer help to finance non-curricular foreign/residential educational visits for Pupil Premium students, with the exception of the induction residential, the Arete weekend, and the Duke of Edinburgh's Award.

The school will also determine greater support for students who are either entitled to Free School Meals or who are formerly looked-after children (post-LAC). The entitlements and projected spending (which varies depending on the number of Pupil Premium students) for 2018/2019 are detailed on the following page.
